Within NCDA, Niles has served in roles such as President (2004), Governing Council Representative (2008-2011), North Atlantic Region Trustee (2005), Trustee-at-Large (1996-1999), Editor of *The Career Development Quarterly* (1998-2003), Chair of the Public Policy and Career Development Council (2006-2008), Co-chair, Long Range Planning Committee (2001-2002), and Research Awards Committee (1993-

Present). Niles has also served as U.S. National Correspondent to IAEVG and is on the editorial board for the *International Journal for Educational and Vocational Guidance* and the *International Journal for the Advancement of Counseling*.

Prior to joining the faculty at Penn State, Niles was a faculty member at the University of Virginia where he served as Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, Professor, and Assistant Dean from 1987-2000. While at UVa, he also directed the Personal and Career Development Center for the Curry School of Education.

Currently, he is the Editor of the *Journal of Counseling & Development* and has authored or co-authored ap-

proximately 95 publications and delivered over 90 presentations on career development theory and practice. He is an Honorary Member of the Japanese Career Development Association (2003), Honorary Member of the Italian Association for Educational and Vocational Guidance (2005), and a Lifetime Honorary Member of the Ohio Career Development Association (2003).

The OCDA Executive Board, at its February 6, 2009 meeting, voted to establish a LinkedIn site to facilitate networking among current OCDA members. There is no cost to the member or to the OCDA organization to participate.

One of the values of any professional organization is the opportunity to network. The Board feels this is a major step in creating networking opportunities within OCDA. Access to the group will be managed by the OCDA Membership Chair.

*What is LinkedIn?

“LinkedIn is an interconnected network of experienced professionals from around the world, representing 170 industries and 200 countries. You can find, be introduced to, and collaborate with qualified professionals that you need to work with to accomplish your goals.

When you join, you create a profile that summarizes your professional expertise and accomplishments. You can then form enduring connections by inviting trusted contacts to join LinkedIn and connect

to you. Your network consists of your connections, your connections’ connections, and the people they know, linking you to a vast number of qualified professionals and experts. Through your network you can:

- Manage the information that’s publicly available about you as a professional
- Find and be introduced to potential clients, service providers, and subject experts who come recommended
- Create and collaborate on projects, gather data, share files and solve problems
- Be found for business opportunities and find potential partners
- Gain new insights from discussions with likeminded professionals in private group settings
- Discover inside connections that can help you land jobs and close deals

CONCIERGE TO THE RICH AND FAMOUS: THE FUTURE OF WORK IN NORTHEASTERN OHIO

Finally, some great news for our downsized formerly solidly middle class and working class career counseling clients facing a future of chaos, confusion and life in an era of diminished expectations. Forget all that stuff about educating the knowledge workers of tomorrow, building expertise in science and math, critical thinking skill for the new flat world of global intercooperation, etc....NO, the real future for workers in northern Ohio is more akin to the middle ages and the era of serfdom, though without the safety net of a warm pallet of straw in the manor owners barn.

I recently stumbled across an article from a few months ago in the Plain Dealer archives written in glowing gushiness about a sort of corporate concierge service run by several of Cleveland's largest law firms to provide personal serfs to ease the stress filled lives of Cleveland's corporate elite, faced with the difficulty of finding good reliable domestic help so they can ponder more important existential/moral philosophical is-

ues like how to increase billable hours.

As noted in the article, a few lawyers at Cleveland's elite law firms, Calfee, Halter and Griswold have access to corporate serfs who will, "bring your grocery list, your dry cleaning or that pair of shoes with worn heels to the office so someone else can run those pesky errands for you."

The article profiles the formerly onerous life of law partner Chris Williams, who before he was able to order a gourmet meal delivered fresh and hot to his office to take home had to worry about picking up his kids and getting them home, fed and calm enough for him to continue working on e-mail etc. at home. As Marcia Wexberg, the senior partner who developed the program notes, "It's magic, it's pure magic." (Please don't sue me Mr. Williams, I'm just a small business owner with no assets.)

President Obama has spoken quite strongly about the needs of the middle class but what seems to be missing is some historical perspective

about the loss of first working class jobs, then middle class jobs and now a future for our children of serving at the beck and call of corporate elites while inequality rises and stable employment becomes a distant memory. I'm not an economist but in my role as a career counselor I've been thinking and writing about these issues for 25 years.

I began my counseling in 1983 in Lorain, Ohio as the steel plants, shipyards, and auto manufacturing that once scented the air in Lorain with a smoky haze of prosperity and progress began to be outsourced and shut down. These first victims of deindustrialization were blue collar workers, represented by vigorous unions whose success fueled economic vitality that allowed union and non-union workers, working and middle class to share values, access to a better future and general prosperity.

After corporate managers who supported the Reagan Revolution and the downsizing of the unionized workforce the unstoppable force of rightsizing,

- You can provide the minimal information to complete your profile; you have control over level of detail you provide. You may want to provide more detail at a later time
- Once your account is estab-

lished, you can follow the steps outlined in the previous section to join the OCDA group on LinkedIn. A “Public Profile URL” is created when you set up a LinkedIn account. You have full control over the amount of your LinkedIn profile detail is available to the public. After you create your LinkedIn profile, be sure to use the Edit Public Profile feature.

out sourcing, globalization found new targets—the middle class, middle income, middle management heart of the American dream and Republican voting base. The irony of how the benefits of health care, pensions, stable employment, fringe benefits, won by organized labor, extended to middle class managers to uphold the social contract of employment were now being stripped from the managerial class was and is a bitter life lesson to accept.

WE ARE ALL WORKING CLASS NOW.

When I hear today’s political leaders promise to look out for the middle class I’d like to remind them that middle class managers and

professionals are a minority of the American workforce and that there is still a working class in America, not as much of a unionized working class any more, but a working class that hopes for better employment than becoming servants and serfs to a small corporate elite. Barbara Ehrenrich, the author of *NICKELED AND DIMED*, reminds us of who that working class is:

“ By working class I mean not only industrial workers in hard hats but all those people who are not professionals, managers or entrepreneurs ,who work for wages rather than salaries and who spend their working hours variously lifting, bending, driving, monitoring, input-

ting, cleaning, providing physical care for others, loading, unloading, cooking, serving and the like. The working class , so defined, comprise 60 to 70 percent of the US population”

The current employment situation in Northeastern Ohio reflects the national atmosphere of chaos and confusion. One of my career counseling clients from my years at InfoPLACE, the career counseling program I managed for 15 years summed it up best, “I feel like I’m working without a safety net—the world is out of control.”
